



he University Secretary Can. Johnson Baryantuma Munono urged Administrative personnel to handle both personal and University data effectively in order

to support the efficient management of the University.

an. Munono made an appeal when adddressing the Administrative staff that attended the record keeping training. He urged them to be responsible and respect confidentiality. This was during the opening remarks of a one-day training workshop for the Administrative staff of KAB.

He noted that, when one mishandles a record, they are likely to put the institution at risk. He further commended the central registry for organizing the training.

A successful administrator should know how to maintain personal records at home. "You need to preserve personal documents like birth certificates, academic transcripts, and appointment letters in personal files at home," he advised.

The facilitators included, Dr. George William Kiyingi a Senior lecturer and Head of the Department for Library and Information Science, Mr Samson Olum, the Director of Human Resources, Mr Patrick Odong, the Senior Librarian, and M Geofrey Magimbi, the Senior Records Officer.

The event was organized by the Central Registry for purposes of orienting new Adiministrative stafff.

Kabale University Staff to participate in the IUCEA staff mobility programme

he Director of the Institute of Language Studies, Dr David Majariwa and a lecturer of Political Science in the Department of Governance, Dr Abbas Mugisha, are gladly participating in the Inter-University Council for East Africa (IUCEA) staff mobility programme. The two will be participating between 27th March and 26th July 2023.

Dr Majariwa will be hosted by the Department of Linguistics, Languages and Literature at South Eastern Kenya University while Dr Mugisha will be hosted by Department of Political Science, Conflict and Peace Studies at Zanzibar University in the United Republic of Tanzania. They will both participate physically in different academic activities at the host Universities.

According to Dr. Majariwa, the opportunity is an avenue for academic and research collaboration with regional universities, appreciating diversity in knowledge perspectives and gaining life experience in a new environment. "My fellow members of staff should seek to participate in the IUCEA exchange program because through it they gain teaching and research experiences, new networks and skills." With a flexible online arrangement, it can be possible for all interested staff to participate incase they find it difficult to participate physically, he added. Dr. Majariwa further notes that KAB subscribes annually to IUCEA. Among the many other benefits we get as members is the mobility program that allows staff exchanges between partner universities. This therefore thus calls upon members to utilize the opportunity to join.

Dr. Mugisha says that this is a great opportunity and a new challenge for him to grow in his academic career. He also calls upon members of staff to find information about the staff mobility programme so that they can participate.

The Staff Mobility Programme is a strategy to enhance the sharing of academic human resource, exchange of knowledge, skills and experiences, in order to effectively contribute to the outputs of the goals of EAC as a Common Higher Education Area.

IUCEA is an institution of the East African Community (EAC) whose mission is to promote strategic and sustainable development of Higher Education Systems and research in support of East Africa's Socioeconomic Development and regional integration. The Participants in the exchange programme are expected to offer their services in either among the university functions of teaching, research and community engagement and /or the external examination.

This was during the opening of the two-day workshop to orient the new academic staff iat KAB. The traning took place at the KABSOM Hall, at the main campus on Kikungiri hill.

Mrs. Bwengye tasked the new staff to appreciate the University's culture and work hard to promote and maintain a strong brand of Kabale University. She also encouraged the staff to always seek for annual leaves after long periods of work so that they can reflect on their personal and professional growth. She welcomed the staff to Kabale University and made a presentation about the University's governance and management structures.

"Research is one of the most important areas of the threefold mandates of the University. This will also promote citations and the university ranking", he added.

He reminded the lecturers to desist from plagiarism which would affect their career growth as sound academic professionals.

In his presentation, the University's Senior Communication and Branding Officer, Godfrey the Sempungu asked new to treat customer care as everyone's business and full time job. He reminded lecturers that they were the core personnel entrusted with the building of the university's image, reputation and total experience that students shall have about KAB. The task of grooming students responsible professionals squarely lies on them. "If we could all effectively teach, mentor and appreciate the students to satisfaction, then they would recommend other students to study at Kabale University without wasting our resources on advertising", he added. He presented several key issues on how staff would profile themselves and stand out as a brand within their faculties and in the university at large.

The University Assistant Director of Human Resources, Mr. Emmanuel Arinaitwe appealed to members to study the policy manuals that guide their day-to-day operations at work. He informed members that the University management values output-based performance. Newly recruited academic staff trained in E-learning

The Deputy Academic Registrar, Canon Benon Freddie Kwikiriza implored newly recruited academic staff adopt to e-Learning because it is the only effective way to teach in this technology era. He made the call during a 2-day (25th & 26th Feb, 2023) training workshop aimed at equipping the new staff with knowledge in e-Learning and the AIMs system of the University that is used to manage student results. He further noted that the COVID-19 pandemic and the consequent lock downs made e-learning a necessity in the education sector. He said that after adopting e-learning, KAB was able to continue business though unusual.

the problem of 'missing marks'. Hard copies could easily be misplaced causing tension between staff and students in the past. But now, we have no complaints because of the good system", he added.

The senior e-learning officer Mr. Robert Tumusiime noted that technology has taken over the world, so higher learning institutions must integrate it into teaching and learning. He noted that online teaching was an effective means of teaching and learning because it makes it flexible for one to teach even when they are not physically present at the university.

The staff members commended the University for planning the activity which helped them acquire the skills required to do online teaching. Speaking on their behalf, Dr. Mary Baremirwe Bekoreire noted that it was going to be easy for the new staff to adopt the system now that they had been trained.

The policy document has a provision for continuous improvement, and awareness and training strategy to ensure that teachers students and are continuously retooled on the basic principles and use of elearning in teaching and learning activities within the university. The planned training will fulfill the strategic provisions of the policy and overall management direction.

Kabale University Scoops Third Position In Public Universities' Ranking

abale University, a government Chartered University based in South Western Uganda was ranked third among Public Universities in Uganda by the AD Scientific Index in January, 2023.

The AD (Alper-Doger Scientific Index) Scientific Index indicates that Kabale University is the third country wide, 153 in the region and 4747 in the World. The Ranking was topped by Makerere University, followed by Infectious diseases Institute and then Kabale University in the third position.

The DVC Academic Affairs, Prof. Benon C. Basheka

was listed among the top 10% scientists in the world. Others included Prof. Natal Ayiga, Prof. Mesharch Katusimeh, and Prof. Denis Sekiwu. A total of 43 of the staff

who participated

were listed among the best 1000 scientists in Uganda.

The AD Scientific Index has a mandate to analyze academic studies from about 21,000 universities/institutions, and over 1.3 million scientists in 218 countries across the globe by using numerous criteria. The results are used for the evaluation of productivity and efficiency by individuals and

institutions. Kabale University, has scooped the third position among the General Universities or Institutions in Uganda.

Unlike other systems that provide evaluations of journals and universities, the AD Index as a ranking and analysis system, is based on scientific performance and added value to the scientific productivity of individual scientists. The Index also provides rankings of institutions based on the scientific characteristics of affiliated scientists.

The rankings of individual scientists are based on 11 subjects of Agriculture &

Forestry, Arts, Design and Architecture,

Sciences and Social Sciences.

Kabale University First PhD Cohort Defends Research Proposals

The Directorate of Postgraduate studies organised the defense of proposal for the first doctoral cohort of students at KAB. This was successfully conducted on the 24th of January 2023. In a session chaired by the Deputy Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs, Prof. Benon C. Basheka, 3 Ph.D. candidates successfully defended their research proposals.

Benon Kyabarongo, Sylivia Tushabe and George Mugavu, all candidates of the PhD in Business Administration made their presentations before a panel of 10 Professors and Doctors. The 3 are part of the 28 students in the first cohort admitted in 2020 following the accreditation of the program in 2019.

The Dean, Faculty of Economics and Management Sciences, Associate Prof. Tamwesigire Caleb noted that the proposal defence was timely and he appreciated the students for having worked hard in order to reach this milestone. He also noted that Kabale University was a young dynamic university that is growing at a fast rate

and therefore committed to becoming a center of excellence.

Prof. Tamwesigire further said that there is has been growth in capacity at Kabale University. with over 30 Professors and about 150 Ph.D holders the ability of the university has grown. These have boasted the Directorate of Post-graduate studies making Kabale University one of the best universities one can attain postgraduate training in at the moment.

Dr. Paul Ssemaluulu, a Senior Lecturer noted that the University was committed to producing critical thinkers who can find solutions to the problems their societies are facing. "That is why we sent the students' work to external supervisors for peer review and to ensure quality research.

Ass. Prof. Denis Sekiwu, Director Postgraduate Training says Doctoral education is very vital in a university. He noted that management was committed to promoting the University research agenda and supporting individual researchers.



The candidates said they appreciated the panelists' comments and they were ready to complete their research on time. "Our faculty has provided us with experienced supervisors who have been available and willing to work with us", said Mr. Benon Kyabarongo (PhD candidate).

The Department of Postgraduate studies successfully conducted the first PhD proposal defence at Kabale University. In a session chaired by the Deputy Vice Chancellor (Academic Affairs), Prof. Benon C. Basheka, 3 Ph.D. candidates successfully defended their research proposals. The Doctor of Philosophy (PhD) in Business Administration (by coursework and research) is



Gifted Hands - Tribute to a loving Father



Canon Karibwije was loved by many and will always be treasured for laying a great foundation for the present day Kabale University. He committed his energy to inculcating good work ethics among students and staff, and introducing the concept of 'work & study' to help needy students attain education while at the university. May his soul continue to rest in eternal peace!

Rev. Can. James Emmanuel Karibwije was a man with gifted hands and a talented individual of great wisdom. He had great pride in his origins from the lineage of the Abungura clan in Kacerere, Kabale. His ancestral family migrated from Kacerere to Kijuguta in present-day Kabale Municipality. He finally settled in Rwere, now Rubanda district. His father was a tree planter who established the first trees for the Church Missionary Society (CMS) on Rugarama hill. Mzee Rwesigobuta later became a trader in Kabale town and died when Can. Karibwije was only three years old.

Due to the challenges of school fees while growing up at home in Kijuguta, Kabale he decided to drop out of school and earn a living as a tailor to pay his elder brother's fees. In school, he was classmates with Prof. Ezra Suruma at Kigezi High School (former Minister of Finance, Planning and Economic Development and presently Chancellor of Makerere University) and Hon. Shem Bageine at Kigezi College Butobere (former Minister of State for East African Community Affairs and Member of Parliament). Can. Karibwije also attended St. Mary's College Kisubi and was a classmate of former Vice President Edward Sekandi among other notable people today.

An elder by the name of Mzee Kakira was responsible for his apprenticeship in tailoring. He picked this vocation and through determination was



able to sew his way through life. His business was accommodated on the verandah of people's shops on Kabale Main Street carrying out his newfound business that earned him an income.

He later re-joined school a little older after supporting his elder brother through high school. This act of service beyond self and sacrifice is still quoted to this day and is an inspiration to the younger generation. Are you your brother's keeper? How do you claim to love God you cannot see and ignore your brother or sister you can physically see? His favourite verse in the bible was, "What good is it for someone to gain the whole world, yet forfeit their soul? Mark 8:36 (NIV).

Integrity opened doors of opportunity for him. He shared fond memories of sewing uniforms for schools in Kabale district. Obtaining contracts as a young man and respecting agreements without formal documentation then, was the mark of the highest level of trust and integrity.

He treasured education and said we should aim for the highest. He always encouraged us by saying that whereas intellectual knowledge and degrees are great, we must learn how to do something technical with our hands. His reasoning was this will come in handy in life both professional and personal. He valued integrity as an important cornerstone in life. Knowledge without integrity will not be beneficial for society.

It is this zeal to work hard with his hands and

intellect that enabled him change careers and have a positive impact on people. He was versatile and transitioned from tailor to student, worked with the Government of Uganda (Ministry of Internal Affairs), ordained as a Priest and joined the Church of Uganda as a deacon, Reverend, and later Canon of the Diocese of Kigezi. He was chaplain to Archbishop Yona Okoth and later Provincial Secretary (PS) of the Church of Uganda (COU). As PS, he was head of administration of the Church of Uganda and Secretary of the Provincial Assembly. He was also responsible for legal, public relations and staff matters as Chief Accounting officer of the Provincial office. He later worked at White Horse Inn, Kabale as Chief Internal Controller (1996 - 2002) before joining Kabale University in October 2002. This ability to adapt and be adapted to different situations enabled him influence many people.

In sports, he performed excellently in athletics. He was a talented middle-distance sprinter in the 440 yards then (today 400m) in Kabale Stadium to the admiration of the regional community. His exploits on the track and field are still spoken about to this day.

Later in life, he earned a Billy Graham scholarship to study in the United States of America (USA) obtaining two Masters degrees – a Master of Divinity degree (1976-79) and a Master of Arts degree – in mission and evangelism (1980-1 & 1984) at Trinity Evangelical Divinity School (TEDS) in Deerfield, Illinois and a Bachelors of Arts Degree in History and Political Science

(1967-71) from Warren Wilson College, Ashville, North Carolina where he continued to work with his hands and earned pocket money as an African student in a foreign land.

The opportunity to earn a scholarship was made possible through the efforts of Bishop Festo Kivengere who recommended him to the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association (BGEA). Later on his return to Uganda Bishop Kivengere appointed him to work with African Evangelistic Enterprise (AEE) as the Executive Secretary. He was responsible to co-ordinate AEE activities at the national level and seeing that all AEE programmes as decided by the National and International Boards are put into operation. He also set up the AEE office in Kigali, Rwanda.

In the USA, he learnt that higher education is not just about earning a degree but community service. Of what use is your degree to the community around you? He often used to say. How has it made a positive contribution and impact to the

environment you live in? The journey of life is the biggest classroom he often quoted.

It is from this background that he nurtured the idea of a work-study program that is now implemented and named after him at Kabale University. As Academic Registrar at the University, he pioneered this effort which was embraced by the leadership. In the same way that he was able to earn money to pay fees for his elder brother and himself, University students too can work with their hands and mind at Kabale University to earn income and pay their tuition. We thank the University for the decision to take up this initiative in memory of Rev. Can. James Emmanuel Karibwije. We are very grateful and honoured.

He encouraged his children and the young generation to value education and keep learning and reading. Education never quite ends and is a continuous activity through life. He believed in excellence in whatever one chose to do and pushed us and others to be the best we could be in whichever field chosen to build a career upon. He guided

us greatly in our Christian walk as born-again Christians of the Anglican Church and by example at home and his preaching and ministry outreach whenever called upon to share the word of God or disciple people.

Can. Karibwije was a good time manager and emphasized the need for us all to be punctual and be good custodians of the time God has given us on earth. Humility is an important virtue he treasured and the need to respect persons of different economic status, background, gender, race and colour. This is the pragmatic Christian faith that our Lord Jesus Christ taught us. Rev. Can James Karibwije was married to Rev. Anna Karibwije (retired priest, Diocese of Kampala) and left behind two Children; Ruth and Daniel and two grandchildren Abigail and Gabriella.

He was a great father who inculcated values and selfless service in his children. His legacy and love shine one. In our hearts, we shall always keep his teachings.

REMEMBERING REV. CANON JAMES KARIBWIJE

he late Karibwije spent about 10 years building Kabale University. In the early times, he was most of the time the only senior person on the ground. Even when I joined him in late 2005, we remained under staffed (what one would explain as overworked and underpaid). He was a committed servant of enviable qualities as I enumerate below:

(1) As a Principled Person: Everyone who knew the Rev (as was his title at Kabale University), can confirm that he had principles and values that he carefully observed. Let me highlight a few of these:

a. Role Model of Integrity

High sense of duty: He served students not just as an Academic Registrar but also as a parent and mentor. He even went out of his way to speak Kinyarwanda in order to serve that community. His motto: IF IT IS GOOD FOR ME THEN IT IS GOOD FOR THE UNIVERSITY – reveals a lot. He could not go home before accomplishing the day's schedule. Even as a Clergy, if he had a lot of work, he would attend the earliest Sunday service at All Saints Church so that he could report for duty.

- Financial discipline example of refunding all the little money he had to account for – even after a year. The Bursar reported how he returned some balance from the petty cash advanced to him – after one year – that he had forgotten to remove from his drawer. How many of us can do that these days? In fact, this financial discipline many times did not endear him to fellow staff.
- He was meticulous in what he did and wanted everyone to write and speak proper English.
 He was a very good proof reader – I used him often to cross-check mistakes. He always reminded us of his proper title: The Rev. Canon

- Firmness of purpose: once he knew his idea would lead to a correct outcome, he vehemently promoted that – many times succeeding.
- Empathy for the Poor: He knew where he came from and wanted to help others in the same category. This was the reason that he worked very hard to introduce The Work-Study Programme at Kabale University. This Scheme enables a poor student to work at the University in lieu of payment of tuition fees. This was his brain child and I am of the over the years the University has strengthened it in order to make it sustainable. The work and study programme today is named after him
- Human resource skills: He knew how to get on with staff at all levels. He was not a loud person but his ears were always on the ground. One would wonder how he got to know what was happening in the University - when he was always at the Office or at his residence - if not in Church. In this case, he was able to gain the confidence of students and staff - hence the release of information even without his asking.

b. Role Model on Health, Hygiene and being Well-Groomed

It is ironic that the late Karibwije did not live upto to 100 years. He was health conscious. He had very disciplined eating habits – no genetically modified foods such as chicken broilers, he ate only the white of an egg, etc, etc. Not only did he observe such principles but he tried to inculcate that in all of us – and reminded people not to over-eat.

High level of hygiene: He always bought the soap for use in University toilets to force people to wash their hands. What surprised all of us is how he could not forget to brush his teeth after each meal – even at the Office.

Young staff would tease him about not trimming his hair. His answer was that they did not study their biology well – hair has God-ordained work.

He was a role model in always being well-groomed. He matched his clothes. Staff would tease him about his suits – and he always reminded them that he was a designer, because in his earlier life, he earned a living as a tailor. He often advised people wearing ill-fitting clothes that as a designer, he would recommend such and such a change, often starting with the phrase: mbwenu nkeitwe ba designers.....

Assessment of a Visitor: I once requested him to host a visitor sent by one of the members of the Board of Trustees of Kabale University. This was the feedback I got from the visitor: Elegant, with etiquette. Oh! The Reverend is such a Prince!

c. Humility

This is an attribute which is difficult to sustain. That is why there is this riddle – ekyeba juba nenki? The answer: obworo, n'obugumba). The late Karibwije served in high positions in the Church – up to the level of the Provincial Secretary for the Church of Uganda. He was highly exposed – as a civil servant and as a traveler. This, however, did not stop him from taking up lesser tasks and doing them very well – at the White Horse Inn – as well as at Kabale University which he joined where there was nothing. Many times, he actually performed the tasks of a Clerk, Messenger in addition to his official roles. When you corrected him, he would humbly say – manya tukyayeega.

d. Keenness on Culture

Every Mungura (his clan members) knows the kind of warmth he would receive from James Karibwije once he discovered that that person was from that lineage. Experience in Nyamasizi Catholic Church in Rubanda. Everywhere he went, he had to look out for his clans' men and women – but also endeavored to inculcate cultural values to staff he worked with.

e. Family Values and attachment

Anyone in Kabale University who interacted with the Reverend knew the value he attached to his family. He always pointed out that it was time to visit the family and touch base. In my view,

he was particularly caring about his children – following up their career progress. I endeavoured to teach him gender issues – not to refer to Daniel as "Omwana, Akaana, etc) as I told him that expression was discriminatory to Ruth!

f. Sense of Humour

People who did not interact with the Rev. Canon Karibwije would not believe that he had a high sense of humour. One member of staff asked me to state that he will not forget his constant smile. He had teasing expressions to the young staff when they made mistakes – wakura! OR ebi byakukiriize amaani! Katubishabire! When it was not easy to see how best to solve problems – he had this expression which would amuse all of us and we would then think properly –

TWAZAKUGIRA, TWAGIRA TUGIRE, RERO TUREBE NKOKUTWAGIRA!

This, he would explain, was the Kiga way of expressing a dilemma.

g. He was very quietly political.

He would analyse political events and had a good idea of the Uganda he would want to see. He occasionally amused us when he mentioned that

he often "mourns" the demise of his political party - UPC!

He was a gem not only to Kabale University but to Kigezi and the country at large. He was lover of many whose efforts in laying a great foundation for the present day Kabale University is invaluable. He committed his energy to:

- a. To inculcate good work ethics among students
- b. Train students not to despise manual work
- c. Introduce the concept of Work and Study at KAB so as to help the needy students

Rev. Karibwije always helped needy students – he emphasized that he understood poverty, as he grew up. Him and his brother worked alternately to help each other remain in school. He temporarily dropped out of school to pay fees for his brother, and after his brother completed training in a tertiary institution, he in turn paid fees for him, as he went back to school. His contribution left a permanent mark on many and it is no surprise that we have the Karibwije work and study scheme. We thank God for his life and contribution to his country.



Several students in the Faculty of Engineering, Technology, Applied Design, and Fine Art have won prizes in the 10th Edition of Arduino Day. The celebrations at Kabale University were on Saturday, 25th March 2023 were organized by the Faculty of Engineering, Technology, Applied Design, and Fine Art in partnership with TME Education. TME Education is a global project that supports technology education in schools, universities, and other tertiary institutions. Generally, the judges noted that they were impressed by the students' ingenuity and creativity throughout the exhibition. They encouraged the participants to continue building and bringing their ideas to life.

The TME Education tutor, Mr. Wanyoto Henry, who opened the event said that TME is a technology organization whose main objective is to promote and popularize electronics education, especially in areas where technology is still limited like Africa. He also encouraged participants to use the opportunity to learn from each other and grow their skills.

In his presentation, the TME Education Ambassador in Uganda, Mr. Ssonko Patrick explained that the Tech Master Event is a community of electronics enthusiasts who share skills, and ideas, and occasionally hold contests through which participants stand a chance to win cash prizes. He also encouraged girls to take part, citing numerous opportunities for them in the Tech world.

During the event, students presented a number of Arduino-based projects designed by the faculty. Arduino is a popular open-source platform usually used to build electronic projects/prototypes. It consists of a microcontroller (programmable circuit board) as well as an IDE (Integrated Development Environment). The IDE is software that is used to program the logic as well as to upload code from the computer to the microcontroller.

KAB Research Ethics Committee (REC) accredited, becoming the first REC in South-western Uganda

The Uganda National Council for Science and Technology (UNCST) has accredited the REC for KAB as a fully fledged committee to protect the rights and welfare of human research participants. In the certificate provided, UNCST notes that KAB-REC has met the requirements and is competent to function as a REC.

According to a press release issued by the Vice Chancellor, Prof. Joy Kwesiga encourages the public to seek ethical approval of research protocols from the KAB-REC. She further noted that after a vigorous assessment process, the **UNCST** trained the Committee members in preparation for take-off and then awarded the Certificate of Accreditation. "I congratulate all the members of the Committee, led by Dr. Alex Barekye, and commend their willingness to serve on this committee. I also appreciate Prof. Natal Ayiga the Director of Research and Publications

(DRP) for having spearheaded the accreditation process", she said.

As a result of the move, academic staff have praised the effectiveness and timeliness of Research Ethics Committee approval. According to the University's Coordinator for Higher Degrees, Prof. Kaaya Siraje, accreditation of the KAB-REC is an opportunity for PhD students to get their research protocols approved on time. He further notes that many RECs are taking a long time to approve student research. "Some RECs have only approved student research about once every four months and have remained silent when students applied. We request our REC to sit whenever there is need for sitting and also to respond to students' applications", he noted.

According to Ms. Jellan Tugeineyo, the Assistant Administrative Officer for the KAB-REC, protocols may be submitted by members of the public from other universities and regions as well. She further says that members of the KAB-REC have already been trained and are now ready to start executing their duties. "There have already been inquiries from people wishing to submit their protocols, and I encourage researchers from the greater Kigezi region and beyond to utilize the KAB-REC since it is the only facility in the region", she added.

As stipulated in the accreditation certificate, the KAB-REC will remain compliant with all applicable national standards for a period of three years, after which it will be subject to renewal. Practice social work as a duty to others; not as a job!

The World Social Work Day 2023 celebrations have been held at Kabale University in the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences at the main campus on Kikungiri Hill. The event was celebrated under the theme "Respecting diversity through joint social action".

Speaking at the function, the Vice Chancellor, Prof. Joy Kwesiga noted that social work was an important profession that directly touches the lives of people. She noted that the practice of social work should be built on 'Ubuntu', a value that helps workers to be empathetic. "When you are empathetic, you do social work practice as a call of duty to others. A social worker should be kind and value the lives of the people they serve", she added.

Prof. Kwesiga further called on social workers to localize their service through community engagement. "There are many street children in our society who abuse drugs and they need social work intervention. Many of these children are from homes which have been overtaken by domestic violence", she further said.

The Dean Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences, Prof. Katusiimeh Mesharch noted that the profession had been hit by the COVID 19 lock-downs between 2020 and 2021. He noted that the lockdown was a period when people needed social support most. "People were not working and staying at home which increased cases of domestic violence, depression, and untimely death", he added.

The Keynote presentation was made by Prof. Sabiiti Makara who noted that social work practitioners still needed to work on challenges that still exist in the community. He further noted that social workers still needed to address social challenges such as domestic violence, depression, increased murders, high numbers of refugees and individualism brought about by capitalism.

The function was attended by social work students and members of staff of Kabale University and other institutions of higher learning in the Greater Kigezi region. It was organized by the Faculty of Arts & Social Sciences and the National Association of Social Workers in Uganda.

"The University Management is aware that the establishment of a REC is important if it must protect the ethical, safety, and proper conduct of the research" added Ms. Katabaazi

"The design of a research project can negatively impact the general social society if the design is wrong leading to wrong conclusions", she furter noted.

Dr. Alex Barekye, the Chair of the KAB REC and Director for Research at Kachwekano Zonal Agricultural Research and Development Institute (KAZARDI) expressed gratitude to the UNCST for having considered training REC members at KAB.

Barekye commended the University Management for its commitment to facilitating the formulation and training of the REC committee and making sure that it is an independent body. He encouraged members to be open to acquire knowledge in the training.


On the other hand, Dr. Barekye cautioned the REC members to take the REC mandate seriously.

"We encourage all academic higher institutions of learning to have RECs because this is a national requirement. Therefore all higher institutions of learning need to embrace RECs." Ms. Nazziwa added.

The 3-day course was facilitated by the Uganda National Council for Science and Technology (UNCST). It was intended to improve Researchers' adherence to good ethical practices in research involving humans, improve the quality of ethical review by RECs, and improve the quality of research protocols submitted for REC review.

The UNCST was established in 1990 for the purpose of inter alia advising on and coordinating the formulation of national policy on all fields of science and technology, and for assisting in the promotion and development of indigenous science and technology. It establishes institutions for and carries out scientific and technological research and development, and it disseminates R&D findings. The Council cooperates closely with other organizations involved in scientific and technological activities.







Kabale University Celebrates the International Francophone Day

Kabale University has celebrated the International Francophone Day 2023, today at the KAB main campus in Kikungiri. Led by the KAB Institute of Languages, the celebration was conducted under the theme 'French at all times'.

KAB Civil Engineering student awarded a micro-grant of GBP990

Afinal year student of Bachelor of Civil Engineering at KAB, Emmanuel Nuwagaba has been awarded with a micro-grant of 990 GBP, an equivalent of about 4.4 million UGX to execute a project on 'Modeling and Analysis of Bio Retention Systems for Removal of Stormwater Pollutants' by the Uganda Institute of Professional Engineers.

Nuwagaba's project aims at solving the problem of flooding and producing clean water for domestic use and irrigation without using chemicals, but capturing and treating storm water using the natural properties of soil and plants to remove pollutants.

In his study, Nuwagaba states that storm water transports eroded soil, animal wastes, litters, salts, pesticides, fertilizers, oil and grease and other potential pollutants which flows directly into the streams and rivers. This impairs the stream water quality and thereby causes a decline in aquatic biota.

He further states that a bio retention is the stormwater best management practices designed

to capture and treat the runoff using the natural properties of soil and plants to remove pollutants.

The President of the UIPE, Eng. Andrew Muwhezi who presided over the awarding ceremony of the micro-grants to Nuwagaba and other 5 students says that these projects will have an impact on the livelihoods of Ugandans. Eng. Muwhezi further called upon the awardees to accomplish the projects in time so they can acquire more opportunities in future.

Nuwagaba's project was supervised by Dr. Abdulkadir Taofeeq Sholagberu, a Senior Lecturer and Visiting Scholar in the Faculty of Engineering, Technology, Applied Design and Fine Art at KAB. The money obtained will be used to execute the project in the community in a period of 3 months.

The micro-grants are supported by the Royal Academy of Engineers in the UK and the Uganda Institute of Professional Engineers. The Academy runs a programme of grants and prizes to support and celebrate the pursuit of engineering activities and to enable closer contact between academia and the industry.

He further says that the students will benefit from engaging in the National debate and other government activities. He notes that as secretary, he will strive to ensure that the necessary information is passed on to the students.

The Deputy Inspector General (IGG), Mrs. Anne Muhairwe Twinomugisha, implored KAB employees to shun corruption and lead honest lives. Speaking during a one-day visit to the University, Ms. Muhairwe urged all members of the academic institution to take responsibility for their actions in life because one reaps what one sows.

She observed that nature has a way of punishing individuals who swindle government money at the expense of citizens citing examples from the confessions made by corruption culprits who usually come to her office.

The Deputy IGG reminded academic members of staff to always be at the forefront in the fight against corruption because they have a direct influence on students' lives. She stressed that students treat their lecturers with high regard as right thinking members of society.

She also warned that every person would leave their positions at a certain point in time, so they needed to take responsibility for whatever they did. She also cautioned them to uphold the law as public officials.

Corruption is still a major problem, with Uganda ranked 142 out of 180 nations in 2022. Ms. Muhairwe pointed out that while corrupt individuals are few in Uganda, they are incredibly strong, well-connected, and syndicated. She added that greed, which drives individuals to desire more than they can pay for, is a key contributor to corruption. However, she notes that there are still good people who expose the corrupt and they are intolerant of corruption.

She was also accompanied by Mr. Sam Agaba who heads the Inspector General of Government's office for the Kigezi sub-region.

National Teachers' Colleges (NTCs) Benchmark at the KAB E-learning center

The Deputy Vice-Chancellor Mrs. Anny Katabaazi Bwengye has said that the university policy to embrace e-learning enabled them to keep afloat during the COVID-19 period when most universities had closed.

Speaking to a group of ICT lecturers and managers from NTCs who were benchmarking at the KAB E-learning center, Ms. Katabaazi noted that KAB was one of the few public universities that continued to teach, examine, and graduate students during the COVID-19 period.

"We do not have a lot of backlogs owing to e-learning, for we used what we had to ensure our students finished on time", she said. She further noted that most of the students had graduated while other universities continued to struggle with backlogs.

Ms. Katabaazi noted that KAB was working hard to achieve the NHCE requirement of sharing with NTCs, Colleges, and schools who would want to come and benchmark with her. She also noted that through partnerships with RUFORUM and the CCODE project, KAB continues to progress in elearning.

The team leader, Mr. Robert Kisalama, the Sector Expert – Institutional Development at the Ministry of Education and Sports, said that the NTCs have decided to benchmark with KAB because it is a productive university that has scored high in rankings both in research and visibility adding that KAB is one of the leading universities in Uganda in terms of e-learning.

He further noted that the Ministry intends to improve secondary teacher training to enable teachers to gain practical skills in ICT's because they are models for the students they teach.

"We are here because we need our institutions to understand what it means to run an e-learning unit, to create content and to sustain good internet connection", he added.

Mr. Kisalama further said that ICT managers and lecturers needed to understand how to use the ICT infrastructure and then be able to guide their students. He implored lecturers to be able to learn how to create content and also be able to facilitate it online.

A 13-member team from NTCs in Uganda was at KAB to compare practices and processes in the E-learning center to inform their strategy.

The KAB student Team captain credited the team's impressive victory to the hard work they put in during practices, noting that they exercised twice daily before and after school.

Ms. Diana Nkamusiima, who played for the KAB male staff football team, Namara Promise, Amutuheire Dianah, and Usabyeneza Agnes, who played for the students, were the female football players who took part in the game.



n an article published on 1st Feb 2023 by Kawawo sports, Hon. Florence Nakiwala Kiyingi says women's football is expanding, and the FUFA female's cup gives girls greater exposure and a chance to play. However, the majority of people, particularly in Uganda, continue to believe that football is a sport for men.

According to Ms. Anny Katabaazi, the DVC (Finance Administration), the idea that football is a 'men's game' is still prevalent. She points out that there is a perception in society that football is for men, while women should only participate in soft feminine sports like netball, and not run around in shorts in the stadium.

Ms. Katabaazi, who has played football since childhood, says that when she got married, people reported her to her mother-in-law for playing football. "Luckily, my mother in law was very liberal and responded that let her be: if you had told me that she was stealing, then I would be concerned", she noted.

Mother of one and teaching assistant at KAB, Ms. Diana Nkamusiima also claims that few people are aware that women can play football. Ms. Nkamusiima, who began playing football in 2011 while still a student at KAB, say that people frequently assume that if a woman plays football, she must be odd.

Mrs. Katabaazi asserts that when a woman performs well in football, even fellow women start to belittle her. They always use sexist language to refer to women who play rugby and football, asking whether they have husbands or children.

Both Ms. Katabaazi and Ms. Nkamusiima agree that football is an important game that teaches life skills that are not taught in the classroom. Ms. Katabaazi notes that the game helps one learn how to cooperate and work together as a team, with individuals of varied strengths and abilities. "Football teaches you to be patient, waiting for the whistle to blow and also your turn to get the ball. Even though you can see the net, you are not supposed to shoot if it is not your number".

She further notes that football makes one disciplined since the players are accountable to their teammates and thus cannot engage in

behavior that compromises the standard of the team. "You learn time management, planning skills and endurance, understanding that you have to come early to the pitch before time, do warm ups and then play at the right time", she said.

Ms. Nkamusiima notes that football teaches you teamwork and giving your best to ensure that your team wins. "Once a football player, you learn problem solving and quick decision making because any mistake can lead your team to lose", she added.

Mr. Akbar Byakatonda, the Assistant Sports Officer at KAB, says that women can pursue a profession in football just like males. He claims that playing football gives women the opportunity to develop their social skills, practice teamwork, and visit new places.


Mr. Byakatonda notes that women can choose football as their preferred sport, just like they can with dancing, swimming, netball, volleyball, and many other competitive sports. Ms. Nkamusiima encourages girls to break the mentality that females cannot play football. "I encourage you to treat football as a career like others because you learn important life skills which will help you in future", she said.

As an institution for higher learning, KAB can promote football among female players. According to Ms. Nkamusiima, KAB can treat both the male and female teams equally in terms of purchasing uniforms, signing them up for games and allocating funds. "KAB can also sign up regional, national, and international competitions which could promote the teams, also market the university. She further claims that KAB can involve their female football players to compete against media outlets and other government organizations such as parliament. All this can promote

In addition, Ms. Katabaazi notes that everyone can contribute to increasing the number of female football players. "We have to change our mindset as parents about football. Many parents complain that schools engage their children in sports. So how will you help your children to engage in sports when you don't like them? You don't have to be a football player to sponsor a game or purchase jerseys and boots". She noted.


